This course covers economics theories of crime and justice. Crime topics include: illegal drug markets, violent crime, nonviolent crime, and international crime. Economic theories and concepts such as rationality, efficiency, supply, and demand are used. The course includes international and historical comparisons of enforcement techniques from both an economic efficiency framework and an ethical perspective.

C. OUTLINE OF MAJOR CONTENT AREAS

1. The course covers many crime topics which may include: murder, rape, prostitution, illegal drug markets, international crime, and the ethics of punishment and crime prevention. Economic theories and concepts in the course should include most or all of the following: efficiency, equity, rationality, discounting, present value, supply, demand, equilibrium, elasticity, normal goods, inferior goods, substitutes, complements, unemployment, and recession.
