In this course, students will study and write contemporary literary fiction. Students will engage in the creative and analytical process of reading as writers, responding to both student and published texts in writing and in-class discussion. Guided by instruction in contemporary aesthetics, students will develop disciplined writing and revising practices.

7. Practice methods in showing vs. telling
8. Shape and revise drafts based on peer and instructor feedback

2. Identify contemporary techniques in fiction genres

4. Understand writing for different audiences
5. Understand the contemporary aesthetics and standards of literary fiction
6. Participate in large and small workshops and be able to respond critically and analytically to each other's fiction, and practice this critical analysis of one's own writing
7. Explore techniques in narrative structures, characterization, setting, point of view, style, and theme
8. Understand that excellent contemporary literary fiction derives from both individual and cultural values that are shaped by broader social, historical, and aesthetic standards and movements
9. Students will be expected to produce a body of revised, polished literary fiction that will culminate in a final portfolio of 20-30 pages
